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VISIT TO THE POPPY FACTORY, RICHMOND, TUESDAY 25th MARCH 2024



The Poppy Factory was founded in 1922 with the backing of Earl Haig and a financial contribution from the British Legion, with the objective of providing employment for wounded veterans of the First World War. It has been based in Richmond since 1926, on a substantial site (a former brewery) near the river which includes the factory and warehouse, a Visitor Centre, and commercial and residential space which the charity rents out.

About twenty-five Probus members and partners met at the Visitor Centre, expertly corralled by Brian Brignall. We watched a nine-minute film of the history and current activities of the charity, which was followed by a forty-minute talk given by one of the charity's volunteers. These explained the adoption of the poppy (as described in Lt. Col. McCrae's poem "In Flanders Fields") for fundraising and the provision of employment via the sale of (originally silk) poppies, and the chance overhearing by the charity's founder, George Howson MC, of Earl Haig's approval of the idea of setting up a poppy factory. They also covered the current activities of the charity, which focus on the creation of wreaths (with individual poppies produced elsewhere), organising the Field of Remembrance at Westminster Abbey each year, and providing employability and employment advice and mentoring to veterans, under the Patronage of Her Majesty the Queen. These were followed by an inspection of displays of charity objects and photographs (old and recent), and the opportunity to try one's hand at making a wreath, with the factory visible from inside the Visitor Centre. Overall, this was an interesting, enjoyable and thought-provoking outing.

LUNCH TALK ON "THE GREAT AIRCRAFT FACTORY" by DAVID HASSARD

David Hassard gave us a history of Kingston's role as a military aircraft manufacturing centre from 1912. Sopwith biplane fighters were assembled in central Kingston during WW1, notably the Camel. The large factory near the Thames in Ham opened in WW1. That factory switched to refurbishment of trucks and production of "Trojan" cars during the interwar years. During WW2 Kingston-based R&D was crucial for the continuing development of the Hawker Hurricane. After WW2 work at the large factory led to production of the Harrier jump jet. It closed in 1993. It's now a housing estate.
