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News from Teddington and Hampton Probus

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
A little piece of Club History Chairman Chris Pollard invited members to take wine with him to mark a notable anniversary... the Club's 540th Luncheon meeting taking place exactly 45 years to the day since the very first luncheon. The 'oracle' aka Peter Turner had trawled the Club archive to put the occasion in context and it was duly toasted in celebratory glasses of 'bubbly'

THE SPIRIT OF BROOKLANDS.....was vividly brought to life by our May guest speaker **Maddie Passtours**, gallantly putting back major surgery to be with us. Her well-constructed and engagingly delivered presentation acting as an ideal 'taster' for the Club's visit the week following. She revealed how **Brooklands** had attained its legendary status as the **birthplace of British motor sport and aviation**.

Maddie went on to demonstrate how the world's first purpose-built motor racing circuit constructed in 1907 at Weybridge by wealthy landowner Hugh Locke King was more than a great sporting arena – the site of many engineering and technological achievements throughout eight decades of the 20th century. The spirit of the place pervades the Brooklands Museum, with exhibits ranging from giant racing cars such as the 24-litre Napier-Railton to a unique collection of Vickers/ BAC-built aircraft including the World War 2 Wellington Bomber, the BAC One-Eleven and, of course, Concorde. The speaker went on to list just a few more Brooklands standout attractions: the Motoring Village with its original tuning sheds; the Vickers Aircraft Park; the nostalgic London Bus Museum and the virtual 'flight' supersonic Concorde Experience.

After a brisk question time, Chairman-Elect Martin Hart proposed a vote of thanks, leaving a number of members with appetites keenly whetted for the upcoming Club visit to Brooklands, and all of us wishing Maddie a full and speedy recovery from her imminent back operation.

WALK FROM STEPHAN LANGTON, FRIDAY STREET, 5 JUNE

OBITUARY



Following on from the talk at the Probus lunch last week, 17 members and wives under the superb organisation of Martin Hart assembled at Weybridge on a glorious sunny day for what was a 'Do it Yourself' tour of Brooklands Museum. The Museum not only has one of the most iconic displays of classic racing cars from the early twentieth century to the present day but also a number of racing motor-cycles. This is not all. The Museum has a collection of Vickers aircraft from the post-war era, together with a hanger display of eighty years of aircraft manufacturing including the Wellington Bomber 'R' for Robert discovered in Loch Ness. Brooklands also has Concorde G-BBDG, the first aircraft ever to carry 100 passengers at twice the speed of sound. That in not all, there is also the London Bus Museum housed in a special building. And, as if that was not enough, Mercedes Benz World was next door where you could try your driving skills on a skid pan!! Many thanks Martin, a most enjoyable day.
