LUNCH TALK ON HABITATS AND HERITAGE by Mr. COLIN COOPER.

Habitats and Heritage is a charity based in South-West London.. The charity's manager Colin explained some of the work of the charity, which on the green habitat side includes creating green hubs, bug maps, cleaning the Thames foreshore, and supporting other groups. On the heritage side it includes conservation and restoration of various mausoleums in the area, one of those being the last resting place of the engineer who provided London's sewage system, Joseph Bazalgette. An oddity concerning that mausoleum: it was second hand, sold to the Bazalgettes in 1825 and came along with the coffin of John Rucker, a German born plantation owner, who still lies there. Habitats and Heritage describes this as this resting place of two men whose work embodies the very best and worst of British history.



Colin did explain that lockdown had increased greatly the interest and support of local people for this charity, which also aims to link green spaces allowing wildlife to transit between them. Not sure how they are supposed to cross the A3 between Wimbledon Common and Richmond Park, perhaps they will put a bit of piping under the road. The next time you're in a cemetery and notice a spruced-up monument surrounded by hedgehogs and butterflies, you will know this charity has been at work. Our own Welsh wizard, Hywel Thomas, gave the vote of thanks and the speaker was warmly applauded.

WALK FROM THE DUKE'S HEAD, TADWORTH - 5TH JULY 2022

Another bright day greeted our thirteen Probus walkers, with just one hitch as the car park to our chosen pub, The Duke's Head, was securely locked at both entrances. The staff inside the pub had no keys, and the cleaner that turned up was keyless also, but she did assure us that the keyholder was usually there around 9.00 am, but not on this day. We had to squeeze our cars directly in front of the pub leaving just the doorway clear, and we set off a little late at 10.30a.m., crossing the road on to Banstead Common. Strangely enough the whole Common had very few walkers, just the odd dog owner, but we were fully armed with our old friend Pepper the sheepdog keeping us all in order.
